HOME BIRTH STATISTICS 1987

Before presenting the 1987 figures it is important to correct a typesetting error appearing in the November National Newsletter. The years shown were out of order and should have been as follows:

Year 1983 1984 1985 1986

Births now on record 267 369 387 534

The 1986 births had been shown as 267, so this correction should restore the picture of steadily increasing domiciliary births. The only other typesetting error was minor: anti-D was shown as 112.1% instead of 12.1%.

In 1987 the number of births continued to increase. An additional 7 forms have been received for 1986, bringing that year's total to 541. This compares with the 549 forms put on computer for 1987 to date. However in 1987 the statistics form was changed and now distinguishes between planned and unplanned hospital births. The analysis below excludes 40 planned hospital births. Because one mother had undiagnosed twins, figures relate to 529 mothers and 530 babies.

The percentages show the proportion of women in each parity group being transferred; eg 34% of primiparas went to hospital. As in previous years, women having their first baby have a higher rate of transfer than others. Nevertheless, two out of three of these women deliver successfully at home. Listed below are complications of labour and of the puerperium the period after birth.

The percentages of mothers with each complication are also shown. As can be seen, the great majority of births were trouble free. Special note should be taken of the low incidence of post natal depression. Because midwives are in contact with the family for at least a fortnight after the birth, they are in a much better position to note any difficulties than the hospital, yet only one in a hundred mothers were noted with this symptom.

Where available, comparable figures have been shown for the whole of New Zealand (source - Department of Health). The 1985 figures are the latest available. The percentages are of births, except that the caesarian section performed for the birth of the twins was only counted once. Low rates of intervention are an attractive feature of having a baby at home.
