

It seems incredible to me that a mother can become a lawbreaker simply by giving birth, and one could suggest the baby is too by association.

Childbirth is a real milestone in a woman's life, and the right to choose the time and place surely must belong to her.

There should, of course, be some pre-birth examinations, and doctors should have the right to hospitalise women they consider may be at risk during birth, or where danger to the baby exists, but it should be remembered

hospitals are not always the safest of places either.

If there is some feministpolitical undercurrent, it will come out eventually, and people will be seen for what they are.

Let's give people a chance to make a contribution where they can, instead of stomping on any initiative with size 10 bureaucratic boots.
