Professor Eric Stroud said such a centre for sick infants should be in or near the city's major hospital.

Professor Stroud, professor of paediatrics at King's College Hospital medical school lege Hospital medical school at London University, said more money needed to be invested in existing neo-natal units which, he felt, were faced and faced

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understaffed and faced shortcomings.
Children throughout the world have lost out in the allocation of money to medical services," he said.
Professor Stroud said New Zealand has become complacent about its children but added: "You're not alone in that."

The attitude seemed to be that the health of the children was good so not too much needed to be spent on

child health, he said.
On home births, Professor Stroud warned women that the perinatal mortality rate would rise here if more moth-

ers had babies at home.

If women insisted on home births, they could not expect to have skilled care, Professor Stroud added.

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
