MEDIAWOMEN, in association with Johnson & Johnson (N.Z.) Ltd, are seeking nominations for women of achievement and excellence.

The MEDIAWOMEN - JOHNSON & JOHNSON AWARDS FOR WOMEN are designed to increase public awareness of the outstanding and diverse contributions by women to New Zealand society.

MEDIAWOMEN - an organisation of women working in all branches of the communications industry - aims to improve the image of women as portrayed by the media.

This is the first year these awards have been offered. We are seeking nominations, which must reach us by May 30, 1982. The awards will be presented in a live television show celebrating Suffrage Day, on Sunday September 19, 1982. The selection will be by an independent panel of judges.

A woman may be nominated for one or more of the following five categories:

- 1. COMMUNICATION: covering media, education and community work.
- 2. ENTERTAINMENT & THE ARTS: covering performance, visual arts, crafts, literature, music.
- 3. SPORT & RECREATION: including both physical and non-physical activities.
- 4. PROFESSIONS, BUSINESS, INDUSTRY & COMMERCE: covering achievements in all work areas.
- 5. HEALTH, MEDICINE & SCIENCE: of special relevance to women and children; includes health education, childcare, physical and mental health, as well as women-based projects in the community, and all environmental work.

Brief Biography of JOAN DONLEY

Joan Donley was born in Canada and graduated as a nurse there in 1938. She lived for some time on the British Columbia coast where in backblock conditions she raised a family and engaged in issues relevant to her life: education, health, road building and electricity. When she and her family immigrated to New Zealand in 1964 she trained in midwifery and gained experience in Auckland hospitals. She then registered as one of Auckland's two domiciliary midwives.

In 1974 Joan began by delivering her granddaughter and since then she has been responsible for more than 500 home births. With two women, whose babies she had delivered, Joan worked to form the N.Z. Home Birth Association Inc. and has given her time most generously in working for the cause. She has tirelessly attended conferences, delivered papers at seminars, prepared reports and articles for journals and the media, appeared in radio and television documentaries and news items on home birth and attends the majority of our committee meetings.

Recently Joan carefully researched and wrote a comprehensive 'herstory' of childbirth in N.Z. This controversial book traces the political developments which have turned mainstream childbirth into an alienating 'technological nightmare'. Joan hopes that it will inspire women to 'reclaim their autonomy in childbirth'. As she is fond of saying 'Its your body and its your baby'.

To be involved in home birth as a midwife requires complete dedication given the unpredictable hours, scandalously low fees paid by the Health Department, the responsibility assumed and the support required by women during labour, birth and the establishing of breast feeding. Joan is regarded as a firm friend by the women and the families of the babies she delivers.

In home birth, Joan uses acupuncture for pain relief and to turn breech babies. She became interested in alternatives to the usual narcotics during three trips to China as secretary of the New Zealand-China Friednship Society. Joan has been a keen champion of human rights in movements opposed to racial discrimination and the Vietnam War.

The Auckland Branch of the N.Z. Home Birth Association is nominating JOAN DONLEY for this award because of her great concern for women and their babies. She is committed to natural birth and birth at home and is a brilliant N.Z. spokesperson for what is an international trend.

Perhaps a personal note is appropriate here. Joan delivered our three babies at home. She has always been generous of her time and knowledge and fully supportive and extremely competant. My first child was born a few weeks premature and with inverted nipples I found it difficult to feed him. Joan lived in with us for eight days, arranging her time around his three hourly feeds, both day and night. With her assistance he was fully breast fed and now as a healthy six year old regards Joan as one of his best friends.

Home birth is now a viable option in a large number of N.Z. cities and in some rural areas. That this is so is in large part because of Joan's efforts and her ability to inspire others.
