### WEEKS TO COME

Citizens Against Taxation (CAT) have joined Access on Saturdays. Their aim is to draw public attention to the many anomalies they believe are posed by the Goods and Services tax, particularly that no precise figures concerning the actual reduction of PAYE has yet been given. Their programmes play weekly at 1.30pm and put forward CAT's philosophy regarding the taxation system.

Play It Live, the programme of live pop/rock music on Saturday afternoons has undergone a transformation. Its now called In Concert, and plays for an hour between 4.00pm and 5.00pm. The name change was made because a series of live programmes from the BBC called In Concert have become available. Bands to feature in the coming weeks include Elvis Costello, Joe Jackson, The Beat, Teardrop Explodes and The Police. There are about thirty concerts in all, with new ones being recorded every two weeks so it has the prospect of becoming a very long running programme.

Boogie Disease has gone for the time being and has been replaced by The Blues Hour, giving blues a continued presence on Access. Over the next few weeks Colin Morris, Bob Child, Sarah Jones and Dave Goley will get behind the microphone to

present an hour of their favourite blues. The Blues Hour - Saturdays at 2.00pm.

The reggae programme This Is Reggae is going from strength to strength with both presenters and listeners. Since starting the programme in December last year, James Eaton has been joined by Ross Hattaway, and more recently by Alma Rei and

Robert Pauling. All four presenters have access to imported reggae music covering several different styles and countries. At present 'ja sound' can be heard every fortnight on Saturdays at 5.00pm, with the possibility of increased presence in the near future. In the meantime you can look forward to a special on Linton Kwesi Johnson on May 11th programme.

Tom Appleton will present four programmes of comedy material not widely heard or available in New Zealand. The comedians featured span from the mid 1950's through to the early 1970's and include the Firesign Theatre, Lenny Bruce, and Wayne and Schuster who performed dramatic spoofs on everything. An example is their sketch called Frontier Psychiatrists which combines jargon from the wild west with that from the psychiatrists couch.

Do you have any women's music? We have half an hour every Saturday evening as a showcase for women's music but our current presenters are running short of material so if you would like to have a go, whether for just one show or several, give us a call.

#### SOMEWHERE OVER THE AIRWAVES

We got a letter last week from a chap who reported tuning in for half an hour on a Saturday evening and enjoying what he heard. Nothing unusual with that I hear you say, but there is when the listener tuned in from Yukon Territory, Canada! Brian Vernon lives in Elsa, a small silver mining community 400 kilometres north of Whitehorse, their territorial capital in northwestern Canada. Brian was using a Drake R7A receiver, with longwire antennas in lengths of 300, 650 and 700 metres. This qualifies as our most distant listener on record.

#### WITHOUT EQUAL

Lora Mountjoy's Radio Review column in the Listener of April 6th is the latest source of praise.

"I once had a friend who wanted to start a radio station which broadcast nothing but continuous readings from James Joyce. There are times when I, too, find myself dwelling on how I think radio should be, rather than purely reacting to the past week's listening. It happened recently when a neighbour beamingly announced that he had discovered THE best radio station in the country. Access Radio. Through some quirk of the airwaves his receiver picks up the distant station, and he enthused for some time over the quality of both spoken and music programmes. My radio is not so clever but I have heard Access on visits to Wellington and have wondered since why RNZ does not replicate the station in other centres. Access is different, the chance for individuals or groups to present their own programmes which they do with flair and surprising skill."

This is just further confirmation of what a good job you, our programme makers, are doing.

#### COMPUTER PROGRAM PROGRAMME

News of more developments in the computer programme. Up until now the programs have been recorded from the radio and then into the computer in two steps. Apple are presently investigating the possibility of feeding a radio tuner directly into the cassette port on the Apple. We at Radio New Zealand are working on the possibility of a program tape of Basicode 2 which is a universal format that allows all the most common computer types to decode the radio broadcast data from a specific user language. Basicode 2 was written by a group of enthusiasts in the Netherlands as a form of computer Esparanto specifically to broaden the base for radio program broadcasts. In its first year over 60,000 copies of the decoding program were sold. Its not too surprising when you consider that having Basicode 2 would allow users to utilise all the programs
