NEW HOME BIRTH FORM.

First of all I hope you all had a happy and relaxing Christmas.

Please find enclosed some copies of the new home birth form to be used from 1 january 1987 onwards. If you have filled in one of the old forms for all births prior to 1987 then please send them to me and destroy any spare copies. I really don't want any births after 1 january 1987 recorded on the old forms if it can be at all avoided.

The new form has been designed to be:

. easier to fill in

. much easier to computerise

. suitable for extracting accurate and meaningful statistics

comparable with the Australian minimum data collected by almost all States and compatible with NZ government figures. This latter means that we should soon be in a good position to compare home births with government figures.

I think the form is fairly self explanatory, however there are a few things that require comment. The most difficult is probably the This is available in a book 'Post Office Post Codes - A Guide to the Post Code System' which should be available from the Post Office. If you can't get one I will send one to you. You should find it fairly easy to give the post code of the post office in the suburb where the mother lives. There is one complication. At each chief post office in each town there is a post code for the streets (delivery by postmen) and a separate post code for the CPO Private Boxes. It doesn't matter which you use but the Private Boxes is easier. Any problems, let me know. But please do try to give the postcode as it will create a lot of work for me otherwise.

There are some questions relating to the mother that you may like o know why they were included. These would be marital status, Ethnic group, Country of mother's birth, and highest education completed. There are two main reasons for recording these:

comparability with government figures. Because statistically these affect the chances of a trouble free birth they have to be recorded to counter the assertion that home birth mothers

are a low risk group.

. they provide important information to use in spreading the home birth message. For example, we know that home birth parents are more highly motivated about birth than others. If we can show that the mothers are better educated than the average it will go a long way towards dispelling the public perception of home births as irresponsible.

Please be sure to circle at least one number in each category. some categories eg procedures or complications you may circle as many as necessary.

In conclusion, what I want you to do is complete any hirths prior to 1987 on the old forms and send them in to me and from 1 january begin using the new form.
